Kotler Nasal Airway FAQ

- 1. Q: Is the Kotler Nasal Airway (KNA) a splint or stent?
 - A: Neither. The KNA is an airway. It's exclusive mission is to provide every nasal/ sinus surgery patient a reliable, functioning nasal airway in the immediate post-op period.
- 2. Q: Any contradictions using the KNA?
 - A: No. Appropriate after rhinoplasty, septoplasty, turbinate and sinus surgery.
- 3. Q: How long can the airway stay in place?
 - A: In the 150 case study, the tubes sat in place for up to 6 days, without any adverse consequences.
- 4. Q: I don't routinely pack the nose. Why should I insert an airway?
 - A: Packing, or no packing, the nasal cavities will fill with blood and mucus. This will cause the non-packed patient to be dissatisfied. Since nose-blowing is unwise and generally forbidden in the immediate postoperative period without a guaranteed airway, the patient will resort to breathing through their mouth.
- 5. Q: If the nose is packed tightly, can the airway device be compressed and rendered inoperative?
 - A: No. A specific durometer (measure of stiffness) silicone plastic material was selected to rule out such a possibility.
- 6. Q: Is it possible for the tubes to be become blocked?
 - A: Yes, possible, but correctable. A home irrigation syringe and tip are included in the KNA kit. Patients and caregivers, who follow the "Instructions for Home Care" card, will be able to prevent blockage.
- 7. Q: Any worries about the tubes "sticking" to intranasal tissue and causing problems in removal?
 - A: No. Medical-grade silicone is the classic non-stick material. Artificial heart valves and artificial joints are made of the same material. Even SuperGlue® will not stick to the Kotler Nasal Airway.
- 8. Q: Does the surgicenter or hospital purchase the KNA kit?
 - A: Yes; analogous to it supplying the anesthesiologist with endotracheal tubes. The facility is responsible for supplying the surgeon with all supplies used in the OR. All consumables should be line-item billed by the facility to the insurerer
- 8. Q: Will insurers compensate the surgeon for additional service of inserting, positioning, and removal of the airway
 - A: Yes. All insurers, including Medicare, have honored a surgeon's fee of up to \$425.00.

Inserting the Kotler Nasal Airway STEP 2

STEP 1



- The KNA is introduced at the conclusion of surgery PRIOR to insertion of packing.
- Use a thin-tip nasal speculum after initial insertion to inspect the nasal interior to ascertain the position of the tubes in the nasal cavity.
- Seat the tube onto the floor of the nose by downward action using the speculum or bayonet forcep. Tubes will "snap" into place on the floor.

Home Care



- The bridge connecting the two will be flush against the columella.
- · The airways maintain the proper position on the floor, lateral to the pre-maxillary bone and medial to the inferior turbinate.
- While the packing is placed, the nasal speculum stabilizes the airway tube.

STEP 3



- After insertion and seating of the KNA, the surgeon passes a 10-French suction catheter through each tube to confirm patency.
- Later, the anesthesiologist uses the same catheter to clear blood and mucus from the throat.
